#### **Level 5: Jesus, the God-Man**

### Focus: The Word Became Flesh and Dwelt Among Us!

Participants will identify the purpose of God's coming "in the flesh," relating the Gospel story of the Incarnation to the Nicene Creed, the Kontakion of the Sunday of Orthodoxy and other liturgical verses. The world into which Jesus was born was not predisposed to receive Him, as reflected by events and persons who sought to kill the Christ child. Even today, the world can ignore the significance of the coming of God in the flesh.

## Session 1 What is the Nativity Fast?

#### Reflect on the idea of waiting and preparation, rather than reducing the feast of the Nativity to a one-day event.

- **List** some ways in which we might "deepen our Advent preparation.
- Commit yourself to reading a series of short biblical texts (one per day) on the biblical history of salvation, leading to the birth of Christ.
- Read and discuss (or reflect upon) selected chapters in <u>The Winter</u>
   <u>Pascha</u>, by Fr. Thomas Hopko, as your personal preparation for the Feast of the Nativity.

# Session 2 Entrance of the Theotokos into the Temple

- **Describe** the event of Mary's entrance into the Temple.
- Select one or more verses that speak of the role of the Virgin Mary in the coming of Christ to the world, and explain why or how Mary's cooperation with God was an essential part of our salvation. (cf. Liturgical Resource Bin for selections.)
- Tell how or why the singing of the <u>Christmas Kanon</u> is part of our preparation for the Feast of the Nativity and what we learn from it.

#### Session 3 The "Winter" Saints

- Identify Saint Katherine and Saint Barbara, as saints that are commemorated during Advent.
- Describe briefly the life of each saint.
- Acknowledge that saints do God's will in many different ways.
- Identify other saints that are commemorated during this Advent season, and tell the story of one of them and the way his/she reflected

#### Session 4 St. Nicholas of Myra and Lycia

- Identify St. Nicholas as a bishop and patron saint of many groups.
- Recognize the danger of refashioning St. Nicholas into a "cozy" figure.
- Suggest meaningful ways of commemorating the life of St. Nicholas during this season.
